## Expressive arts and design

We would like you to get messy with the children. This will allow your child to get creative and explore with different skills such as; assembling, joining, cutting and sticking. We would like you to have a go at junk modelling Gather some recycled items that you may have accumulated over the week.

Before any junk modelling, plan what your child would like to make. It might be car, an aeroplane or even a musical instrument.

Then you can have some fun! Here are some ideas; make an aeroplane out of a plastic bottle, make a guitar using an old tissue box and elastic bands, make a car out of a cereal box and use milk bottle lids as wheels. If you've made a form of transport, you might want to go head to head and see which one is the fastest.

If you've made musical instruments, you might want to make up a song or sing songs together.
