


Year 1 - Other Subjects


Choose as many activities from the list to do as you want. These can be completed over one week or longer.

<u>Subject</u>	<u>Activities</u>	<u>Websites or apps for computers, tablets or phones.</u>
Art	<p><u>Colourful World</u> Before the school closure, the children were learning about British artist Wassily Kandinsky. Unfortunately, many were away when we created a piece of artwork in his style. Activity: Create your own version of 'Circles'. See picture below:</p>  <p>You can do one, large circle or a collection of smaller circles together like above. Feel free to use paint, coloured pencils, markers, chalk, etc. to complete your artwork.</p>	<p>This is a great video showing a tutorial on how to create a version of 'Circles.' https://youtu.be/q5aqtNEYbhI</p> <p>A lovely cartoon about the life of Kandinsky that the children might enjoy watching: https://youtu.be/qXcAkgPKDxc</p> <p>Pinterest.co.uk has great ideas on different ways to create works by Kandinsky. <p>D&T (design and technology)</p>	<p><u>Colourful World</u> Activity: Build a frame to put a piece of artwork or a photo into. When designing your frame, be creative with how you build and decorate it - make sure you measure the size of the fame to ensure it fits your artwork or photo. Some materials you can use: Cardboard, paper, lolly sticks, straws, plastic, sticks, play dough, clay, etc.</p>	<p>YouTube has many great tutorials on how to build a frame using different materials. Pinterest.co.uk also has some great craft ideas for designing a picture frame.</p>
<p>Science</p>	<p><u>Plants</u> It's Springtime! When you go outside for your daily exercise, pay close attention to the trees, plants and flowers around you. What do you notice about them now that the weather is becoming a bit warmer? Questions to think about: - What does a plant need to grow? - Why are plants (flowers, trees, fruit and vegetables, etc.) important? - What are the different parts of a plant and what are their purposes? Activity: Plant your own seed! Many supermarkets are currently selling seeds. On your next shop, pick some up to plant. Alternatively, many foods and plants you already have at home contain seeds. See if you can find some to plant. If you don't have soil or compost, you can put your seed in a clear, plastic bag with a damp paper towel and tape it to a sunny window.</p>	<p><u>PictureThis - Plant Identifier</u> is a free app that allows you to use your phone or tablet to instantly identify different plants. It also provides plant care tips and information on plants from around the world. Also, it's free! ☺ Purple Mash: Science - Plants</p>

Computing	<p>Activities: Practice your typing! Programming - Write a set of instructions using 'forward', 'back', 'left' and 'right'. Have a member of your household follow your instructions. Online Safety - Design a poster about the importance of staying safe online.</p>	<p>Purple Mash has great programmes to practice your typing: Tools - 2type <u>Bee-Bot</u> app. It's free and can be used on your phone or tablet.</p>
RE / PSHE	<p>Activities: Work with a member of your household to create a set of rules that everyone should follow in your house. These rules should be used to keep everyone safe and happy. Display somewhere that everyone can see. Role-play the importance of keeping clean during the Coronavirus outbreak. This could be a demonstration on how to wash hands properly or how to open doors without touching handles. Have a discussion with a member of your household about where money comes from and what money can be used for. Create an 'earn and learn' system at home (try it for a week or so). A grownup can create paper money that the child can earn for doing good things around the house. They can then use the "money" they earn to pay for things like snacks or other rewards set out by the grownup.</p>	<p><u>Pigby's Fair</u> is a free app created by Natwest, which is designed to teach younger children about saving and spending. It takes children on a trip through an animated fairground where they can manage their own stall, develop new stock and earn virtual money that can be deposited at Pigby's Bank. New levels and items are unlocked by reaching their savings goals. There are no in-app purchases.</p>
History	<p>Activities: Have a discussion with a member of your household and make a family tree. This can be as small (immediate family) or as large (extended family) as you want it to be. With a grownup, write a letter, design a postcard or video call an older family member that you don't get to speak to very often. Try to find out 5 new things about that family member and teach them 5 new things about yourself.</p>	<p>Purple Mash: Topics - history - postcards This website allows you to create your own postcard that you can design and send. <p>Geography</p>	<p>Activities: Research where your family comes from. Use Kidrex.com to search for information about that country. <p>Music</p>	<p>Activities: Sing some karaoke. Lyric videos can be found on YouTube. Make up your own song for when you wash your hands for 30 seconds. Make an instrument from everyday objects and play it. Spend some time listening to music you might not typically listen to (classical, blues, folk, etc).</p>	<p>YouTube has many great kid-friendly lyric videos. Try searching 'Kids Bop Karaoke' or 'Disney Sing-A-Long'. <u>Groovepad - Music and Beat Maker</u> is a free app where children can make up their own beats and music.</p>
