<u>Phonics</u>

Parents - We know this is a lot of information to take in and you are not phonics teachers. Please do not feel under pressure! We have tried to keep it simple, but if you are new to phonics, the following resources can help. It is your choice whether you do any of these activities. Do not worry if you choose not to.

- <u>Phonics Phase 3 Sounds for Pronunciation Colette McGinley</u> on Youtube will show you how to make the sounds.
- <u>Phonics Phase 4 Blends and Clusters Pronunciation Colette McGinley</u> on Youtube will show you how to make the sounds.
- <u>Phonics Phase 5 Sounds Pronunciation</u> on Youtube will show you how to make the sounds.
- <u>AlphaBlocks</u> on Cbeebies (available on iplayer) will show you how to segment (sound out) words and blend them together again.

A phonics session should take 20 minutes, at most. If it is taking longer, feel free to have a break and try to finish another time. We want you and your child to enjoy home learning!

1) <u>Recapping sounds</u>

You could do this by asking your child to say the sounds on the sound mat included, or making your own flash cards (1 sound to each card, mix them up and then show them to your child).

2) <u>Blending and segmenting simple words</u>

First the adult fingers the word (this means saying each sound, touching 1 finger for each sound) and the children blend the sounds together (they put the sounds together to say the word). E.g. adult: c-a-t child: cat

Then the adult says a full word and the child robots (waves arms up or down for each sound in the word) or fingers it. E.g adult: pin child p-i-n

3) <u>Reading</u>

We read simple words. You could do this by writing the word on paper or typing it on a screen. Your child should try to read the word by themselves. You can remind them to look at the letters, make the sounds and blend the sounds together. We have put the sounds in brackets (p-i-n) so that you know the sounds your child should be making.

4) <u>Writing</u>

We write simple words and then a sentence, making sure the letters are formed correctly and facing the right direction .You say the word out loud and your child will say the word, robot the word, write the word or say the word, finger the word, write the word. Your child can robot or finger the word, whichever they prefer. We have included a harder word (<u>underlined</u>) in each write session if your child needs a challenge!

Remember, many words <u>do not</u> have to be spelled correctly. However, we do want your child to apply the sounds they have learned. High Frequency Words or Sight Words (see mat below) should always be spelled correctly.

Phonics Play

There is a fun website called Phonics Play (<u>https://new.phonicsplay.co.uk/</u>). They are currently allowing access for <u>free</u> with the username march20 and password home

Across the top of the screen are tabs. There is a **PARENTS** tab with general information. There is also a **RESOURCES** tab where you can find various phonics games. There is a further menu of **PHASE 1- PHASE 6**. Your child has learned <u>phase 1</u>, <u>phase 2</u>, <u>phase 3</u> and <u>phase 4</u> so you can choose these games options. We had almost finished <u>phase 5</u> when the schools closed, so you can choose these games as well, but your child may need more support. All of the sounds your child has been taught are on the sound mats included.




