Spelling: Write down as many 6 letter words as you can. Beginning with 'p' e.g. praise

Wednesday 6 th	<u>Challenge activities</u>		
Grammar: Find as many different words (synonyms) for big and small as you can.	Describe each member of your family using some of the words that you have discovered to help describe their height. Remember to choose appropriate words for each person.		
Create a mind map to show each of the words 'big' and 'small'. Find at least 10 for each.	E.g. My little sister is miniscule because she has only just been born.		

Thursday 7th	and	Friday	8 th	Writing	Task
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Work on this over two days: Plan your idea on Thursday and write it on Friday.

Write a newspaper report - just like the one we wrote about the Tear Thief.

<u>Include the following features:</u>

- Name of the newspaper
- alliteration

Task

- introductory paragraph (what, where, when, who why)
- chronological order
- pictures and captions
- third person
- past tense
- direct and reported speech
- formal language
- conclusion paragraph.

How to do it

Choose something that has happened at home which you think is newsworthy - this could be somebody's birthday for example.

OF

Having read a book write a newspaper article about something that happened in it - this could be about one of the wishes Harmony makes in the Queens nose!

OR

Write a newspaper article about the Coronavirus and what is happening in the world at the moment. OR

If you have a better idea for a newspaper article than one of these suggestions write that instead.

Leave a few lines for your headline (write this at the end when you have finished.)

First, I suggest you write the introduction - remember to ask yourself and answer questions about the 5 w's. You must tell me what happened, where it happened, when it happened, who was there and why it happened or why it was important.

Optional further ideas

If you have more to say about your story add an additional paragraph into it. You can do this while you are writing it or afterwards. (if you do and you publish your work put it in the correct place then!)

Edit your writing - make sure you are happy with what you have written (it makes sense, it is spelt correctly, you have used punctuation!) Get someone else at home to read it, see if they understand it - get them to make some suggestions which would improve it further.

Publish your writing - you could do this in your book. Remember to use your neatest writing and do not miss out any of the amazing details you wrote. Add some pictures to your work to help people understand the article.

OR

The next two or three paragraphs should have a point which you write in one sentence. It should be about one part of the story, which you then explain in the next few sentences.

The last paragraph should be a conclusion paragraph which tells people what the consequence of the story is. Are people happy or sad, do they need to do something?

Finally, I would create the headline for the story now you know exactly what it is about. Make sure its short, catchy and makes people want to read the article! Put this at the top of the page where you left space!

There is an example below, about a school which was attacked by a dragon to help you - a much more interesting idea than the ones I suggested I'm sure you'll agree!

Use purple mash find the newspaper reports in the English section, choose a template, and type up your report, adding pictures to that too!
