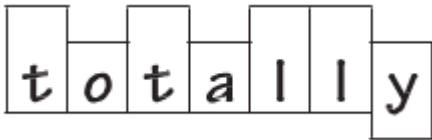

Choose an attraction you would like to write about. 2. Research your chosen attraction on the Internet. OR make up an attraction (e.g. a fun fair) and make up all the things people can do there. 4. Make notes on a piece of paper. 5. Fold a plain piece of A4 paper into thirds to create your leaflet. 6. Decide on your sections for your leaflet e.g. introduction, activities, map, opening and closing times, prices etc. 7.
