Spelling:

Have a go at finding as many words as you can that use the prefix 'dis'.

Example:

dislike

disobey

disappeared

What is a prefix?

A prefix is a letter (or more than one) that is added at the front of a root word. This changes the meaning of the word. For example, disappear. 'Dis' is the prefix and 'appear' is the root word.

Looking at the words that you found, can you work out what the prefix dis means?

Challenge activities

Can you have a go at writing a sentence for each word that you have found?

Try to make your sentences as interesting as possible!

E.g. Surprisingly, the large creature disappeared into the darkness within the blink of an eye.

Wednesday 13th

Grammar:

Have a go at writing 8 sentences using an appropriate fronted adverbial.

The fronted adverbial starts the sentence and tells the reader the **where, when or how**. For example: Earlier today, I had a pizza.
